

William and Richard Reddick Documents and Chronology

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This summary is an attempt to straighten out the chronology for Richard Reddick, and his father William. Richard is the father of Martin, who is my great-great grandfather (my line back to him: Kem Luther, Billie Rodabaugh, Lena Jordan, Hannah Reddick, Martin Reddick). In 1990 and 1991 researchers were generous in supplying me with documents and interpretations of how William and Richard relate to my family line. The following pages are in no way a finished product: the goal is pull together into one place the documentary evidence for this line of ancestry in a form which can be sent out to other researchers. If a paper copy of this comes to you second-hand, you should contact me for the latest version. If you are reading this on the World Wide Web, you are looking at the most recent version.

In the first Appendix is a full bibliography of materials on the Reddicks which are in my possession. In the second Appendix is a list of correspondents. At the end is an index of persons and places. I have a list of the known descendants of my great-grandmother, Hannah Reddick, in family register format. It is not included here to avoid listing genealogical data for living people on the web. Please contact the author privately for this list.

Note that I have standardized all spellings of the name in the documents to "Reddick." In earlier generations there are sometimes spelling variations (e.g., Redick, Reddeck) in the primary documents relating to William and Richard Reddick.

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Chronology

Numbers in square brackets (e.g., [0]) are references to bibliographic sources in Appendix A. The birth entries of the progenitors and any child of William or Richard Richard are in bold SMALLCAPS. At each birth entry I have included pointers to the marriage and death dates.

- 1732 The ship *Adventure* arrives in Philadelphia in September. On board are Ossell Trump, age 40, and her (presumed) children, Susanna Ossell, Adam, and Anna Barbara (ages 12, 10 and 8, respectively). This Adam may be the father of Margaret Trump, who married William Reddick.
- 1760-62 **WILLIAM REDDICK** born in Ireland. His tombstone [27] gives the date as 1760, while Sulgrove [30] gives 1762. He married in 1784 and died in 1831.
- 1765-68 **ANNA MARGARETH TRUMP**, who was to marry William in 1784, was born on 29 June 1768 [35] in Pennsylvania [69], though a calculation from Sulgrove [30] suggests a birthdate of 1765. The baptismal record also shows her sisters Anna Barbara and Anna Maria being born in 1761 and 1763. Margaret died in 1859.
- 1773 William comes to the Colonies with his parents. Date given in Sulgrove [30]. Filby's immigration lists [12] note that a Christian Reddick arrived in Pennsylvania in 1772. Some connection may be possible between Christian and William.
- 1777-83 William joins the Continental Army, serves in Captain Lawrence Keene's Company, Colonel John Patton's Pennsylvania Regiment, until 1781, and is discharged in 1783 while in a company commanded by Captain Doyle. He claims to have been in the battles of Brandywine, Germantown, and Monmouth, and at the capture of Cornwallis [25]. Patton's Pennsylvania regiment was at Valley Forge with General George Washington. William was a Fifer in the Fife and Drum Corps[163].
- 1784 William married Margaret Trump in Lebanon, Pennsylvania, in September. In the pension papers of William the year is given as both 1784 and 1785. They were married by Rev. Story [25].

- 1786 **RICHARD**, the eldest son of William Reddick and Margaret Trump, was born on 24 August [13] [20] in Pennsylvania.¹ For marriages see under 1811 and 1823. He died in 1871, on August 29 according to the Held Bible [20].
- 1788 **MARGARET**, daughter of William and Margaret, is born. This date has been circulating among Reddick researchers (see, for example [5]). As far as I know, this date is an extrapolation. No document I know of gives her specific birth year. The marriage and marriage date are also undocumented in this work: in the letter of Morgan [24] the date of birth is given as 1788 and the last name of her spouse is listed as Wells. The Margaret Wells in Marion County, Indiana, in the 1840 census [63], the widow of Isaac Wells who probated his estate in 1831 [55], is probably this Margaret. For a guess at her death see under 1870.
- 1790 **WILLIAM JR**, William's son, born 30 September, in Pennsylvania [25].² When William Jr died is not known; however, Edith Black points out in a letter that his name occurs circa 1858 on his brother Joshua's will, so it must have been after 1858. For marriages see under 1813 and 1823.
- 1790/1800 It is not clear when William and Margaret left Lebanon, Pennsylvania, for Washington County, Pennsylvania, but it must have been in this decade.
- 1794 **KATIE** (full name Catherine, but called Katie), William's daughter, is born on 23 September, according to the date on her tombstone. See under 1815 for her marriage, and 1883 for her death.
- 1797 **ELISHA**, William's son, born on 9 January in Pennsylvania. Date from Sulgrove [30]. For his marriage, see under 1822. For death, see under 1893.
- 1800 William and family are on the 1800 census for Washington County, Pennsylvania [41].
- 1800/1 A guess at the birth date of **MARY** ("Polly"), daughter of William. On the 1830 census she appears to be under 30 [53]. See under 1815 for marriage, and 1833 for death.

¹The 1860 census gives Kentucky as the birthplace [82]. This curious fact lends some minor plausibility to the assignment of several Kentucky records [39] [38] [40], [42] [43] to this William Reddick. However, Sulgrove [30] does not mention a Kentucky sojourn before 1805.

²William Jr reports on the 1850 census [68] that he was born in Virginia. His son Austin also says this about William Jr in 1910 [113] but not in 1900 [112]. William Jr's sister Katie, according to her obituary [93], was also born in Virginia a few years later. I do not know how to account for this citation of Virginia at a time when the family was supposedly living in Pennsylvania.

- 1803 William and Margaret move with children to Virginia for a year, according to Sulgrove [30].
- 1804 **JOSHUA**, William's son, born in Washington County, Pennsylvania, on 20 May, according to Sulgrove [30]. For his marriage, see under 1828. His death was in 1859.
- 1805 According to Sulgrove [30], William and family move to the vicinity to Bracken County, Kentucky. This is just across the Ohio River from Clermont County, Ohio. Presumably his entire family accompanies him. The *History of Brown County, Ohio* [21] has the date of the move wrong by a few years.
- 1808 **HELEN**, William's daughter, is born in Kentucky, according to the 1860 census [80] and her age on her father's pension papers [25]. Her name is "Helia" on the pension papers. She was married in 1826, and died in 1881.
- 1810 **LUCINDA**, William's daughter, is born, according to the date on her father's pension papers [25]. She was married in 1825 and 1827. Sulgrove [30] reports she lived in Marion County, Indiana from about 1825-65, before moving to Missouri. She probably died in 1898 in Gaylord, Kansas [162].
- 1810 The William Reddick family appears on the 1810 census, living in Bracken County, Kentucky. [44]
- 1811 Richard, William's oldest son, married Mary (Polly) Miller [45], and settled down in Clermont County. Judging from the 1820 census [49], Mary must have been born after 1794, but it cannot be much after, or she would be too young to be reasonably married by 1811. I am not aware of any marriage record. Mary was the daughter of John Miller.
- 1812 **RACHEL**, William's daughter, is born, according the date on her father's pension papers [25]. According to Sulgrove [30], she was born in 1810. She was married in 1831. She died after 1884, when Sulgrove [30] reported that she was still living, but the exact year of her death is not known. This is the last of William and Margaret's children.
- 1812 During the war William is said to have kept a ferry at Bull Skin Creek, forty miles above Cincinnati, according to Sulgrove [30].
- 1812-13 Richard and Mary's oldest son **MARTIN** is born on 21 January 1813 [13] [20]. *The History of Brown County* gives the day as 22 January 1812 [21]. Martin's marriages were in 1835, 1837 and 1894. He died in 1907.

- 1813 William Jr, son of William, married Polly Jack on 17 April in Clermont County [10].
- 1813 Richard registers stray horses in Clermont County, Ohio [46].
- 1815 Richard's father William moved across the Ohio River into Clermont County, according to Sulgrove [30].
- 1815 Katie Reddick, daughter of William, married James Kittleman in Clermont County on 9 March 1815 [10]. For a list of children, see [76] [83] [89].
- 1815-16 Mary Reddick, daughter of William, married James Giles on 14 November 1815 [22], or on 14 December of the next year [10], in Clermont County. For some of her children, see [67]. Gene Brown apparently has more information: he lists more of her children in [7].
- 1816 **WILLIAM** born on 16 February to Richard and Mary. Probably stillborn [13] [20].
- 1816 In the summer of this year Richard's father William placed a notice in the paper about finding a stray horse [47].
- 1817 **JOHN**, who is to die a young boy in 1819/20, was born on 8 October to Richard and Mary [13] [20].
- 1818 On 8 August William, residing in Clermont County, petitioned for a pension based on his service in the Revolutionary War [25].
- 1819 **ELISHA**, fourth son of Richard and Mary, born on 3 May [13] [20]. He was married in 1863, 1868, and 1874, and died in 1890. His birth date is given as 3 May 1816 in his obituary [96], and 8 May 1816 on his gravestone [32].
- 1820 On 15 September William filed a declaration in connection with his petition for a pension, and inventoried the people in his household. Living with him was his wife Margaret, daughters Helen, Rachel, and Lucinda, and his son Joshua. On the papers he described himself as a person without real estate or valuable goods, whose debts exceeded his net worth.
- 1820 Richard and his father William's families are living in Clermont County and are enumerated on the census [49]. By now four children, Martin, William, John and Elisha, have been born to Richard and Mary, and one, William, has died. Perhaps Elizabeth Miller is living with them. William's family corresponds to the 1820

petition, except an older son is living with them: probably Elisha, who was not yet married.

- 1821 Birth of **WILFORD** Reddick on 19 September in Felicity, Felicity Twp, Clermont Co, Ohio. He died 13 June 1903 in Ashland, Nebraska. He married Nancy Jane Kennedy on 26 September 1844 in Brown County, Ohio. Wilford is possibly a son of Richard Reddick, but not mentioned in the will.[29]
- 1822 Elisha Reddick, son of William and Margaret, married Elizabeth Johnson on 20 June 1822 in Clermont County [10]. She was born in Clermont County, Ohio [136], and probably died in the 1870-80 decade. For a listing of their children, see [1] [81] [87] [135] [110], [111].
- 1823 William's son William Jr married Phebe Tharp/Thorp on 30 January [10], in Clermont County (second marriage). She was born circa 1797 [68]. For a listing of their children see [68] [75] [86] [80].
- 1823 **MARY**, the daughter of Richard and Mary, was born on 7 May [13] [20]. Mary (Polly), the mother, died in June [13], perhaps from complications of childbirth. Mary the daughter married Elisha Creager [34], but the exact date is not known, and died in 1912.
- 1823 Richard married Mary's sister, or double-cousin,³ Elizabeth Miller on 18 or 19 October [50] [20]. Elizabeth was born in the 7 May 1796 and died 2 April 1844 [20].
- 1823 William's son Elisha became a pioneer settler in Marion County, Indiana (near Indianapolis) in October [30].
- 1823-24 Sulgrove [30] suggests that William and his family left Ohio in November 1823, but did not come to Marion County until the fall of 1824. Where were they in this year?
- 1824 Richard and Elizabeth bought 100 acres of land on Willow Creek in Clermont County [28]. His father William moved to Marion County, Indiana, in the fall of this year [30].
- 1824 Richard and Elizabeth's daughter **ELIZA ELEN REDDICK** was born 22 September according to the Held Bible [20]. Using the fact that she married a Brown, it is possible to pinpoint her marriage to 1845. Her death date is unknown

- 1825 William and Richard paid taxes on Ohio land in Clermont County in this year [51].
- 1825 Lucinda, daughter of William, married David Cothran in Marion County, Indiana, on 9 June [23]. For a possible child of this marriage see [68].
- 1825 Richard and Elizabeth's daughter **AMANDA JANE** was born in Ohio on 3 December, according to the Held Bible [73], presumably in Clermont County. She married Jacob Held in 1851. Her death date is 5 October 1878..
- 1826 Helen, daughter of William, married Alexander McClaren on 30 April in Marion County [23]. For some of their children, see [15] [16] [80].
- 1827 Richard and Elizabeth's son **RICHARD PERRY** was born on 24 October, according to the Held Bible [20]. He died on 10 July 1833.
- 1827 Lucinda, the daughter of William, married on 25 June 1827 to David Eller [52]. For some of the children in this family, see [84].
- 1828 Joshua, son of William, married Elizabeth Eller on 2 November in Marion County [23]. She was the daughter of Adam Eller [30] and was born circa 1813 [69]. Joshua travelled with his family until he moved to Marion County, Indiana, in 1823. In 1848 he and his family moved to Clinton County, Illinois. The names of the children are given in [1] [78] [69].
- 1828 Richard and his son Martin, who is 16, moved to Cincinnati and took up wagoning about this time [21]. They both were living on John street.
- 1830 Richard was living in Cincinnati during the census [54].
- 1830 Richard and Elizabeth's son **WILLIAM HARVEY** was born in Ohio on 8 November, according to the census and the Held Bible [20]. He was known as "Harvey" in the census and "William H." in his father's will. He married in 1855 and 1859. His death date is unknown.
- 1830 William and Margaret were living in Marion County [53]. The census seems to imply that Margaret was living with William Jr and William was staying with Elisha.
- 1831 William died in Marion County, Indiana on 3 October [25] [27].
- 1831 Rachel, daughter of William, married Moses McClaren on 22 Jan in Marion County [23]. For possible children see [71].

- 1832 Richard and Elizabeth's daughter **SUSANNAH** was born in Ohio on 12 March, according to the census [73] and the Held Bible [20]. She married in 1852 and died in 1926.
- 1832 Approximate death date for Mary, daughter of William. Sulgrove [30] says it was "about 1831," but the ages of her children [67] suggest that it may have been a year or two later.
- 1834 Richard cited as living on John and Kemble, in Cincinnati, working as a teamster [56].
- 1835 Martin, Richard's son, married for the first of three times on 10 December 1835 to Jane Walker in Hamilton County, Ohio [57]. No children from this union are known.
- 1836 Richard cited in Cincinnati on John and 8th, working as a teamster [58].
- 1837 Martin, son of Richard, married Matilda Creager, 23 March, in Hamilton County, Ohio [59]. She died on 13 March 1892 [4]. For a list of children see [7] [17] [21] [99], [100] [72] [85] [91].
- 1837 Richard and Elizabeth's daughter **AMELIA ANN REDDICK** was born 29 January and died 6 August [20].
- 1838 Margaret, wife of William, was allowed a pension on 22 November based on her husband's service in the Revolutionary War [25].
- 1839 Richard and Elizabeth's son **MORRIS MILLER** was born on 11 September in Ohio [31] [73] [20]. He married in 1863. He and his wife are buried in the West Lebanon Cemetery in Warren County, Indiana, but the death date is not known.
- 1840 Richard and Elizabeth were still living in Cincinnati [61]. Living with them were their children, presumably Morris M. (age 1), William Harvey (10), Amanda J. (14), Susan A.(8), and perhaps Mary (17) and Elisha (21). There is an extra boy in the 15-20 bracket that I cannot account for.
- 1842 **MARTHA MALINDA ELISABETH** (called Elizabeth in some documents) was born to Richard and Elizabeth in Ohio on August 3rd, according to the census [73] and the Held Bible [20]. Her marriage and death dates are not known. From her father's will it appears that she married a man named Cooper.
- 1844 Elizabeth, Richard's second wife, died (date guessed at).

- 1845 Eliza, daughter of Richard, married John Brown on 13 July in Warren County, Indiana [8].
- 1846 Richard married Catherine Dilks on 13 February [66], his third marriage. Catherine was born about 1804, according to the 1850 census [73].
- 1848 Approximate date for Richard and Catherine move to Warren County, Indiana. He bought and sold a farm and several town lots in the 1849-68 period.
- 1849 Helen, daughter of William, her husband Alexander McClaren and family moved to Clinton County, Illinois, to judge by the ages and birthplaces of the children on the 1860 census [80].
- 1850 Richard and Catherine enumerated in Warren County, Indiana [73]. Living with them were Amanda J., William Harvey, Susan A., Morris M. and Elizabeth.
- 1851 Amanda J., daughter of Richard, married Jacob Held on 22 May in Warren County, Indiana [8]. Jacob and his brother began a harness shop in this year in Warren County, Indiana, which he sold in 1866. In 1874 he and Amanda moved to Illinois, and in 1879 they moved to Harper County, Kansas, where Jacob died 29 September 1893. Data about Jacob is from [97] , which also contains a list of their children.
- 1852 Susan A., daughter of Richard, married Samuel M. Bush on 18 January in Warren County, Indiana [8].
- 1855 William Harvey, son of Richard, married Keziah Russell on 2 September in Warren County, Indiana [8].
- 1856 Margaret (Trump) Reddick sells bounty land on 26 September [77].
- 1859 Richard's mother, Margaret (Trump) Reddick, died about 4 January in Clinton County, Illinois [79].⁴ Sulgrove [30] says she died of milk sickness.
- 1859 William Harvey, son of Richard, married Nancy E. Hall on 21 January in Warren County, Indiana [8].
- 1859 Joshua, son of William, died in Clinton County of milk sickness. His will was made out on 24 September 1858 [78]. He died in October [30].

- 1863 Morris M., son of Richard, married Charlotte Runyan on 1 January in Warren County, Indiana [8]. Charlotte was born on 4 October 1842 [31]. For a list of children, see [31] [153].
- 1863 Elisha, son of Richard, married Margaret McKenzie on 15 September in Warren County, Indiana [8].
- 1868 Elisha, son of Richard, married Lucinda Smith on 12 December in Warren County, Indiana [8].
- 1869 Richard made out his will in Brown County, Ohio, on 29 October [88].
- 1870 Approximate death date for Margaret, daughter of William, perhaps in Missouri [30].
- 1871 Richard died on 23 August [13] or 20 August [88]. He presumably died in Brown County.
- 1874 Elisha, son of Richard, married Matilda H. Long on 12 November in Warren County, Indiana [8].
- 1881 Death of Helen, daughter of William Reddick, in Clinton County, Illinois on 25 March [92].
- 1883 William's daughter Katie died of apoplexy in Kansas [30], 30 April, 1883 (date from tombstone). The obituary of Katie says that she moved first to Iowa, then to Kansas (Riley County) [93].
- 1890 Elisha, son of Richard, died on 30 July in Warren County, Indiana. The date is on his tombstone in Hillside Cemetery in Williamsport, Indiana [32] and in his obituary [96]. Elisha was the coroner of Warren County the two years before his death [94].
- 1893 Death of Elisha, son of William [95] on 14 April. He is buried in the Spring Valley Cemetery in Marion County, Indiana.
- 1894 Martin, son of Richard, married Sarah Catherine Campbell, 17 February, in Brown County, Ohio [98].
- 1907 Martin, son of Richard, died in Brown County, Ohio, on 25 February, 1907 [99], [100].

- 1912 Mary, the daughter of Richard, died on 14 March, according to her stone in the Bloom-Rose Cemetery in Brown County, Ohio. Her husband Elisha Creager (1814-1896) is also buried there [4].
- 1926 Susan A. died on 16 January, according to records in Warren County, Indiana (reported by Doris Brown in a letter).

Appendix A: Bibliography of Reddick Documents

Mary Reddick married James "Jiles" [Giles] on 14 December 1816; William Reddick [Jr] married Polly Jack on 17 April 1813, then Phebe Thorp on 30 January 1823; Elisha Reddick married Elizabeth Johnson on 20 June 1822; Catherine [Katie] Reddick married James "Cattleman" [Kittleman] on 9 March 1815; Eliza Reddick married George Kleckner on 6 June 1842.

County (stillbirth?)
John Reddick, b. 8 October 1817, d. 1819 (Clermont County)
Elisha Reddick, b. 3 May 1819
Mary Reddick, b. 7 May 1823, m. Elisha Creager

There are also death (June 1823) and marriage (1812) dates for Mary Miller, and birth (24 August 1786) and death (23 August 1871) dates for Richard.

She discusses possibility that Mary Miller (m. Richard Reddick) is the daughter of Martin Miller (b. 1759, Lancaster Co, Pennsylvania, d. 1816 in Clermont County, Ohio). She says "I cannot show that Mary was definitively the daughter of Martin, but she was accepted as such by the First Families of Clermont County."

William Harvy Reddick was born November the 8th 1830. Susannah Reddick was born March the 18th 1832. Amelia Ann Reddick was born January the 29th 1837. Morris Miller Reddick was born September the 11th 1839. Martha Malinda Elizabeth was born August the 3rd, _____. Marriages: Richard Reddick and Polly Miller was married in the year 1812. Richard Reddick and Elizabeth Miller was married October the 19th 1823. Deaths: Polly Reddick died June 1823. John Reddick died 1819. Richard Perry Reddick died July 10th 1833. Amelia Ann Reddick died August the 6th 1837. Elizabeth Reddick died April the 2nd 1844. [In another hand:] Amanda Jane Reddick died Oct the 4th 1878.

Has short biography of Martin Reddick. Says that Martin's father is Richard and his mother is Mary Miller, and that they came to Ohio in 1800. Martin was born on 22 January 1812. He went to Cincinnati at age sixteen (1828), and drove a team there for nine years [until 1837]. He married Matilda Creager [note: text has error, says "Nitzer," which was Matilda's mother's name] on 23 March 1837. She was born on 30 March 1812 and came to Ohio from New Jersey in 1817. Martin and Matilda bought the home farm in 1839. The names of his children and their spouses are listed [the name of Hannah's spouse, Walter Jordan, is mistaken listed as "Gordon"].

Page 186 has short biography of Abram Liming and two descendants, J. W. Liming and J. O. Liming. Abram married Mary Elizabeth, daughter of Martin and Matilda, in 1871, and had three children: Luella, Mary Elizabeth and Martin Reddick.

There is an entry in the Pennsylvania section showing that Joshua, son of William Reddick and Margaret Trump, was born on 20 May 1804. It is possible that this date is based on Sulgrove [30].

Another entry shows that Anna Margareth Trump, daughter of Adam Trump and Anna Maria, was born on 21 August 1768. The source of this citation is not known, but it may be [35].

An Ohio entry shows several Clermont County entries: Mary Reddick married James "Jiles" [Giles] on 14 November 1815 *and* on 14 December 1816. Others correspond to the Clermont County marriage records [10].

William Jr, b. 1790, brother of Richard, m. 1st, Polly Jack (1813), then Phebe Thorp (1823). Lucinda, b. 1808, married Coffin [Cothran] before marrying Eller, and Helen, b. 1806, married a McClaren. Elisha T. married Elizabeth Johnson in 1822. Rachel b. 1819. Other information per Sulgrove history [30].

Richard, the eldest son of William Reddick, was born in 1786. William, the third child, was born 30 September 1790. William served in Captain Lawrence Keene's Company, Colonel John Patton's Pennsylvania Regiment. He married Margaret Trump in September 1784 (married by Presbyterian minister, Rev. Story). At home in 1820 are Joshua (14), Helia (12), Lucinda (10), Rachel (8).

In reference to the marriage of James Milton Reddick to Mary Ann Holmes Day: According to "The Day and Hendrix(cks) Families, including the Poe and Allied Lines" by Ruth Hendricks DeVerter, copyright 1964, Baytown, Texas, three Day siblings married Reddicks.

Michael Huff Day (b: 15 Sep 1822) mar: 15 Jan 1848 Margaret Ellen Reddick

Mary Ann Day (b: 27 Dec 1823) mar: 2 Feb 1844 James Milton Reddick

Samuel Day (b:24 Jan 1829) mar: 8 Sep 1853 Elizabeth Ann Reddick

All three marriages occurred in Marion Co, Indiana. These three Day siblings are the children of Mark Day and Elizabeth Huff. I am trying to obtain a copy of this work (I have a partial xerox copy) but have not had much luck. In the mean time, Mrs. DeVerter, a distant cousin of mine, donated a copy of this family history to the LDS Family History Library in Salt Lake City, Utah.

Miller in the *History of Brown County* [21], pp. 252-53, gives birth dates for R. F. M. and Martha McCoy Miller of 1835, too late to be the parents of Mary and Elizabeth. This page shows Richard Reddick and Elizabeth Reddick buying 100 acres of land in Clermont County, on Willow Creek (citing a document given to her by Edith Black).

Wilford Reddick, one of the original settlers of Marble Precinct, who made his home here in 1869, died at his home in Ashland, June 13, 1903. He was born at Felicity, Ohio, Sept. 15, 1821. he lived in Ohio until 1857, then moving to Lee Co., Iowa, where he remained for several years. His subsequent life was spent in Scotland Co., Missouri, Fulton Co. , Ill., until he made his home in Saunders Co., Ne., on a homestead Oct. 6, 1869. In 1893, he moved to Custer Co., Ne., making his home there for two years. In the year 1900 he made his home in the town of Ashland, Ne., where he resided until the time of his death.

He married Nancy Jane Kennedy Sept. 26, 1844, in Brown Co., Ohio. His widow and 7 children survive him. His home was blessed with 10 children. Living survivors include, J.R. Reddick, L.M. Reddick of Bethany, Mrs. Sara E. Charling of Mead, Charles B., George W., William Harvey Reddick of Ashland, and Mrs. Maggie Hunter of Memphis, Ne. Three children preceeded him in death , they are, Louise Jane, John K., and Ida May. He was a victim of heart disease, which caused him great pain and suffering. Funeral services were at home with internment at Ashland Cemetery.

Grandchildren attending Funeral , Ora A. Reddick, Arlie C. Reddick, Harvey C. Reddick, and Gertie Miller. This were men and women of Cotner University, of strong influence.

[30] Sulgrove, B. R. *History of Indianapolis and Marion County, Indiana*. Transcript of a section (p. 539) on William Reddick of Lawrence Township. Also sections on Lawrence Township have information on Elisha Reddick.

William was born in Ireland about 1762, came to the Colonies when he was 11. He joined a division in the Revolutionary War at 13, served for six years. He was bound to an older brother in Ireland to learn the weaver's trade, and was rebound in Pennsylvania. He married Margaret Trump after the war, near Lebanon, Pennsylvania [the text says he "returned," so he may have lived in Lebanon before the war]. William lived in Pennsylvania for nineteen years after his marriage. He then went to "Virginia backwoods" for one year [presumably 1803]. William moved to Kentucky in 1805, Bracken County. William is said to have kept a ferry at Bull Skin, forty miles above Cincinnati, in Clermont County, during the War of 1812. About 1815 he moved to Ohio. William came to Marion County, Indiana, in 1824. He died October, 1831. He had ten children, two of whom did not move to Marion County. Children who lived in Marion County were Margaret (moved to Missouri about 1844, died age 82), Polly [Mary] (m. James Giles, d. circa 1831), Katie (moved to Kansas about 1864, died there in May 1883, m. James Kittleman [spelled "Gittleman" in this document]), Elisha [see below], Joshua [see below], Helen (b. circa 1808, d. circa 1880, m. Alexander McClaren, moved to Illinois about 1843), Lucinda (She was living in Lathrop, Missouri, in 1884, and lived in Marion County until about 1864. Her marriage to David Cothran in May 1825 was the first marriage in Lawrence Township.), and Rachel (m. Moses McClaren, lives west of Castleton). Sons William and Richard are not mentioned, presumably because they did not come to Marion County. His wife Margaret died in Clinton County, Illinois, at age 93 of milk sickness. Both William and Margaret were Methodists almost all of their lives. William was a class leader, and often hosted circuit preachers at his house.

The entry on Joshua says that he was born in Washington County, Pennsylvania on 20 may 1804. He arrived in Marion County in November, 1823, and helped convey his parents there in 1824. Joshua married Elizabeth, daughter of Adam Eller, and moved to Clinton County, Illinois, in 1848. He and three of his adult children died in October, 1859, of milk sickness, and his wife died of it in April, 1860. He had seven children in Indiana and one in Illinois. Four were dead by 1884. One of them, Catharine, married George Church and lived in Marion County until she died in 1878.

Elisha was born 9 January 1797 in Pennsylvania. He was the first settler in Lawrence Township, coming the year before his father, in October 1823. At an early age he moved with his parents to Kentucky [presumably 1805], and then to Clermont County in 1813. He lived in Marion County from 1823 to 1874. He had a son named James Milton. The first white children born in Marion County were the twin sons of Elisha, William Perry and John Newton.

He has one female in his household (wife?) and one boy under 16. Near William is a Michael Trump.

William has 3 sons, one under 10, the other two in the 10-15 range. He has two daughters, one under 10, the other 10-15. The boys are presumably Elisha (3), Richard (14) and William (10). The girls would be Katie (6) and Margaret (12).

[42] Montgomery County, (Kentucky?). Transcribed page of Personal Property Tax 1787, List "A", mentioning a William Reddick, Jr.

[43] Clift, G. Glenn. *Second Census of Kentucky, 1800*. Baltimore: Genealogical Publishing Company.

Page 242 shows a William Reddick in Campbell County, Kentucky. This is a pseudocensus, reconstructed from tax lists, and does not show anything about William's family. Since William appears on the 1800 census for Washington County, Pennsylvania, it is doubtful whether this is the William Reddick being followed.

Richard has three boys under 10, he is in the 26-45 bracket, and there are two women 16-26 in the house. If we accept the data from Mary A. Fischer [13], the three boys would be Martin, John (assuming he died about the time of the census and not in 1819), and Elisha.

William Reddick is living next to Richard. He is over 45, and has one son 10-16, another 16-26, two daughters under 10, one daughter 10-16. This corresponds to the list of children in the pension papers of 1820 [25], except for the extra son 16-26.

There are two boys, one 10-15 and the other under 5, and the four girls are 10-15 (one), 5-10 (two) and under 5 (one). There is also an entry for William Reddick, which has two girls under 5, a man 30-39, a woman 20-29, and an older woman 60-70. (The two older people in the households of Elisha and William could be William and Margaret, the parents.)

Richard's will was originally recorded in Brown County, Ohio, and transferred to the records of Warren County, Indiana, to facilitate the disposal of his properties in Warren County. The will is witnessed and attested by Thomas and Mary Sheldon. It was written on 29 October 1869. It mentions his sons Elisha, Morris M., and Martin, and his daughters Amanda Held and Mary Creager, and wills to them parts of his estate. It also mentions, but leaves nothing to, his daughters Eliza Brown, Susan Bush, and Elizabeth Cooper, and his son William H.

The estate papers were ultimately filed on or after February 1883 (the latest date recorded in the papers) by John W. Sutton. Sutton and Elias Schlosser became bondsmen for the estate in February 1877. Presumably Sutton took over the administration at that time. He became administrator "de bonis non." The original administrator, however, was Jacob Held, Richard's son-in-law. He was appointed on 26 October 1871, with Henry Held and Henry Herick (sp?) as guarantors. The land was not sold, and the bequests disbursed, until Sutton took over the administration. Richard's death date, according to a deposition of Jacob Held, was on 20 August 1871.

In 1851 his brother Henry became a partner in the business, and in 1866 he sold out to his brother and took up farming. In 1874 he moved to Illinois to farm. Five years later he moved to Harper County, Kansas. He died on 29 September 1893. He was married to Amanda Reddick, sister of (the deceased) Elisha Reddick and Morris M. Reddick, both of Warren County. The children of Jacob and Amanda Held: Lewis and Clara, living at home, three married daughters, and Charles, who died earlier. Jacob died on 29 September 1893.

He is the son of Morris M. and Charlotte Reddick. He was born at Williamsport, Indiana, on 28 February 1864, and died at Indianapolis on 3 December 1889. He has a brother Chauncey in Williamsport. Frank was working as a painter in Indianapolis, and died of "painter's colic." Buried in West Lebanon Cemetery.

- [154] Reddick, Benjamin C. Obituary. He was the son of Richard P. Reddick. Also the obituary of his wife, Lela Maude Thompson.
- [155] Reddick, Dan. Summary of information on Richard P. Reddick, his ancestor (son of Martin and Matilda).

Richard P. Reddick was born 19 December 1837 in Cincinnati, Hamilton Co, Ohio. He died 9 January 1917 in Amelia, Clermont Co, Ohio. He spent his last years living with his daughter Lillian. Richard is buried in Bloom-Rose Cemetery. He was a farmer/teamster in Perry Twp. He farmed at St. Martins, a few miles northeast of Fayetteville. His religion was Methodist. He served in the Civil War in Co. G 175th O.V.I. from 27 September 1864 to 21 June 1865. The 1860 census of Sterling Twp shows Richard P., a 22 year old farmer living at home with Martin and Matilda. He married Esther Cramer on 1 January 1861 in Clermont Co (Clermont Co Marriages Book #8, p. 90). Esther was born 23 September 1838 and died 15 December 1906, and is buried in Bloom-Rose. She is possibly the daughter of Samuel and Esther Cramer, listed in the 1850 Perry Twp census (Esther is 11). Their children are (1) Matilda J. Reddick, d. 6 Feb 1863, aged 1 month and 17 days, buried at Bloom-Rose, (2)

Benjamin Cramer Reddick, b. 8 March 1866 in Brown Co., d. 1945 in Cincinnati, m. Lela Maude Thompson, (3) Lillian Francis Reddick, b. 1869, Brown Co., d. 23 October 1940 at her residence on Congress Ave. in Cincinnati. Never married, no children. Buried in Bloom-Rose She resided in Amelia, Clermont Co., in the 1910s and 1920s. She resided at, and was employed by, Cincinnati Country Club, Grandin Rd, Cincinnati in the 1930s. (4) Henry R. Reddick, b. 29 March 1873 in Brown Co. He was a minister and lived in Akron, Ohio. His wife's name was Ida. His children were Carl, Ivan, Hazel, Ruth and Mildred.

- [159] Reddick, William of Allegheny County, Pennsylvania. There are a number of documents pertaining to this William. He is easy to confuse with the William in this study because he lived in the part of Allegheny County which borders Washington County, and several records relating to him appear in Washington County records. Here are the major documented events in his western Pennsylvania stay:

pre 1780: "Lists of Inhabitants in Washington County, Pennsylvania, 1800 or Before" by Raymond Martin Bell, Washington, Pennsylvania, 1961, reprints the list of names from southwestern Pennsylvania and West Virginia who signed a petition for a new state in 1776-80. There are three Reddicks, William, Joseph and Thomas. It is not clear where Joseph and Thomas might have been living. William is probably the one who appears later in Allegheny County.

1784: "Tax Lists of Washington County, Pennsylvania: 1884-85 and 1793," by Raymond Martin Bell, shows a William Reddick living in Robinson Township (which later became part of Allegheny County).

1787: "The People and Times of Western Pennsylvania," by Clara E. Duer, published by Western Pennsylvania Genealogical Society, April 1985, has in Appendix B a list of persons taken from the 27 January 1787 *Pittsburgh Gazette* who had delinquent taxes in Smith and Hanover Townships of Washington County. William Reddick is one of these. He is also in a 1788 list in the same paper, where his location is given as "Raccoon."

1789: "Miscellaneous Cemeteries, Washington County, Pennsylvania," Volume II, 1988, on p. 75 has a list of persons at the Montour church who signed a petition to call a minister to Raccoon Church. At the head of the list is William Reddick.

1790: *Heads of Families at the First Census of the United States Taken in the Year 1790: Pennsylvania*. Copy of index page 15 showing William Reddick in the Allegheny County section. He has two over-16 men and one woman in the household.

1810: "Will Abstracts of Allegheny County, Pennsylvania, Will Books I Through V," compiled by Helen L. Harriss and Elizabeth J. Wall, Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, 1986, p. 23, summarizes the 5 May 1810 will of William Reddick of Moon Township, Allegheny County. Two children, John and Margaret, are mentioned, as is a son-in-law Isaac and a granddaughter Betzy Justice. A family group sheet by Lois C. Tollefsen, 2005 13th Avenue, Kearney, Nebraska 68847, published as sheet 2276A in the collection of the Genealogical Society of Southwestern Pennsylvania, shows that Margaret Reddick married Isaac Justus before 1780.

- [160] Strassburger, R. B. and Hinke, W. J. *Pennsylvania German Pioneers*. Norristown, Pennsylvania: Pennsylvania German Society, republished Baltimore, Maryland: Genealogical Publishing Company, 1966. Copy of p. 85 of Volume I with Trumpt entries.
- [161] Washington County, Pennsylvania. There are several Reddick references in the county records which relate to families which have an unknown relationship to the William Reddick being studied (see also the group of records in [159]). Most are about the family of a David Reddick, an important figure in Washington County (a typical summary from a county history can be found in the first reference). He was an early settler in the area, coming first with the survey teams. He became a judge, and played a role in Pennsylvania politics which brought him into the circles of such notables as Benjamin Franklin and George Washington. His relationship to William, if any, is not clear.

Crumrine, Boyd (Ed.) *History of Washington County, Pennsylvania*. Philadelphia: L. H. Everts and Co., 1882. Page 49 has a summary of David Reddick's life.

"Reporter Records, Marriages and Deaths, 1808-1825, Washington, Pennsylvania," 1975, has the 4 February 1819 marriage of Dr. James Stevens to Ann Reddick, and the 25 November 1818 marriage of Col. William Anderson to Eliza Reddick.

"Militia Fines, 1794-98, Washington County, Pennsylvania," 1977, shows Jonathan Reddick being fined in 1795.

"Washington County, State of Pennsylvania, An Abstract of Will Book One," 1976, summarizes five Reddick wills (dates are probate):

Jonathan Reddick, 30 June 1812, mother Ann Reddick is beneficiary and executor.

David Reddick, 29 July 1807, beneficiaries are wife Ann, sons Jonathan, David and James, daughters Nancy, Eliza, Sally wife of Thomas Swearingen, Peggy Israel.

Rachel Reddick, 16 April 1810, mentions daughter Sally McKee.

Ann Reddick, 17 December 1817, beneficiaries are son David Reddick, daughters Nancy and Eliza.

David Reddick, 2 October 1835 in Jefferson County, Ohio beneficiaries are wife Ellen, daughters Mary Wilson Reddick, Ann Hoge Reddick.

“Lists of Inhabitants in Washington County, Pennsylvania, 1800 or Before” by Raymond Martin Bell, Washington, Pennsylvania, 1961, mentions John H. Reddick, miller, and Rachel Reddick, widow, the the 1800 county census of taxables.

Federal census of 1810 for Washington County mentions David Reddick and Rachel Reddick in the town of Washington, and Bridget Reddick in East Bethlehem Township.

Email correspondence with Paul Reddick (psreddick@aol.com) in 1998 reports information from a source known as “Notes & Queries, Historical and Genealogical” of Jan 1894. It says that David was the “son of John Redick, emigrant from north of Ireland and Rachel Hoge, dau of John Hoge, an early settler in the Cumberland Valley, b. 1750 East Pennsboro twm, Cumberland Co PA, d. 28 Sep 1805 . . . mar Ann Hoge, his cousin, dau of Jonathan Hoge of Cumberland Co PA.”

- [162] Nickols, Fred. Correspondence. Fred wrote in April, 2005, that Lucinda Reddick “might have died in Gaylord, KS instead of Adair County, MO. I obtained her Civil War pension claim for her son, David Cothran Jr, and among the many documents it contains was the termination of her pension in 1898. It shows her last payment of \$12 as being made on 2 Nov 1897 and her removal from the pension rolls in early 1898 owing to her death. Other documents in the same file place her in Gaylord, Kansas in the late 1880s, with son Joshua Eller and his family. She signed another pension form (or made her mark) in Kansas in early 1897.”
- [163] William Reddick appears to have been at Valley Forge with Washington’s army from December 1777 to June 1778, since he was with Patton’s Regiment. See the online database at <http://valleyforgemusterroll.org>. Further information on William’s army career (that he was a fifer in Fife and Drum Corp) is mentioned in the study at <http://www.revwar75.com/library/rees/musician2.htm>. 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Index
